The course is subject to change at the discretion of the instructor.

Description: A continuation of MATH 153 with emphasis on trigonometric functions, vectors, systems of equations, the complex numbers, and an introduction to analytic geometry.

Homework: Homework will be assigned frequently. Homework are due on Friday of each week (with some exceptions). Homework are organized on a weekly basis in the homepage in Canvas or can be found in the “Assignments” tab of Canvas. Homework is worth 20% of your total grade.

Check-ins: Once every week I want to hear from you. You can email, join office hours, or send a message in Canvas. You might include: questions about the content, updates on your progress, requests for accommodations, etc. If you need to keep it brief you can simply say “All good. No questions.” so I know you’re keeping up with the course. The weekly check-in is 5% of your grade.

Quizzes: The quizzes are timed. Quizzes may have multiple attempts (with some exceptions). The quizzes are worth 15% of your total grade. Due dates for the quizzes are noted in each weekly module.

Exams: Exams are timed and you have two attempts (from which your highest score is kept). Exams must be taken on the day they are due. If you need an exception be sure to request before the due date (see Latework and Makeup). The exams are worth 40% of your total grade. There are 4 exams. Each exam is ~ 10% of your grade.

Final Exam: The final exam will be comprehensive. The final is timed for two hours. The final is worth 20% of your total grade.

Late work and Makeup: Makeups for all assignments will be given on a case by case basis when circumstances are both valid and verifiable, e.g. illness, bereavement, and school-related activities. Documentation may be required. It is expected that exceptions to due dates be requested prior to the due date.
